RESULTS OF HLCP ANNUAL CARERS SURVEY 2009/10

The Annual Carers Survey questionnaire was circulated in the January edition of the newsletter to the 258 carers then registered with us. The Holistic Therapy Survey was given to carers and ex-carers using the service when they visited the centre.

The overall response was overwhelmingly in support of the work that is being carried out by the Project and evidenced that services delivered are meeting the needs of most, the quality provided is exceptionally high and the relationship between the staff and carers could not be better. Some quotes included:

'Staff at the Centre are brilliant, info is readily available, Centre is very good at helping carers coping with stressful situations.'

'I am grateful for these (therapy) sessions as I find that I have a lot more energy for a few days afterwards. Also feel that they are helping my physical mobility problems as well.'

'I think that the staff do a hugely important and successful job in what they do. The centre is welcoming and the things they offer are well organised and relevant.'

The response also included some interesting comments on the benefits of the services provided and how these might be extended or improved. When asked if there were any other services carers would like to see the Project provide, some suggestions included:

'A telephone help line.'

'More outreach services/events for rural areas...'

'More training days to help with caring role and to gain employment.'

'Encouraging carers under 60 and young carers to come forward.'

'A support service for carers dealing with mental health illness.'

'Young Carers.'

These have been referred to the Project Manager for consideration. The data collected is invaluable in evidencing what the Project has achieved over the past year and outcomes of the surveys will be used to secure future funding, maintain and develop services.

Carer Training for Helensburgh and Lomond Carers

I have recently started as Training Co-ordinator, my time is split between Helensburgh and Lomond Carers Project and North Argyll Carers Centre. I began my working life as a Careers Adviser and moved into the development and delivery of learning and have spent my working life involved in learning in a variety of roles throughout the Highlands and Islands. Having been born in Western Isles and brought up in Mallaig the lure of the West Coast proved too much and I am delighted to be working with Helensburgh and Lomond Carers Project and look forward to meeting and working with you all in the future.

My role is part of a larger project funded by the Big Lottery's Investing in Communities Programme. The training project supports identified carers who live in rural and remote areas. Over the next two years, we will be assessing and evaluating the training needs, skills and knowledge of local carers. We will be developing training courses and toolkit of good practice to share with others centres across Scotland and the UK.

What does this mean for you?

With partner support we will provide learning opportunities for unpaid carers - sessions on issues that are relevant to **you** in **your** caring role. We can also offer advice, guidance and support you to look into learning opportunities that interest you. They may not be part of your caring role but may be interests you have that you would like to develop.

Sessions will enable you to build on your own expertise and gain further knowledge and confidence from health professionals and peer support. I will also be collecting a range of information on learning opportunities that will be part of the information board and library in the centre.

Your views!

In the initial stages of the project I am gathering as much information as I can about what training people feel would be of benefit and would be really grateful if you can share any ideas you have on what would be of use to you. I can meet you at the Carers Centre or come to your home, and help you to identify any training that you might benefit from. I will be in Helensburgh every second Tuesday and can be contacted on my mobile phone when I am not at the centre.

'Improving Support For People Helping To Look After Someone With Dementia in Argyll & Bute'

Alzheimer Scotland is carrying out research which aims to improve support and information provision to anyone supporting, or helping to support someone, with dementia in the Argyll & Bute area. The research is part of a wider project covering NHS Highland area.

Two development workers, Davy Macdonald (Argyll & Bute) and Lynne O'Donnell (Highland) have been employed to work on the project, which is funded by the Big Lottery. They want to find out what challenges and barriers carers face in accessing support for themselves and for the person they are helping to look after.

Davy stated that "The majority of people with dementia who live in the community receive considerable unpaid care and support from husbands and wives, family members, friends and neighbours. This saves the country an estimated £900,000,000 annually but can result in a heavy cost to the carer in how it impacts on their life. This project aims to reduce this impact and improve the quality of life of the carer, and consequently, improve the life of the person with dementia".

They need to hear from people who are currently helping to look after, or have previously supported someone with dementia. The information provided will be crucial in shaping the design and content of a dementia specific Carer Resource Guide for the NHS Highland area. This guide will be a comprehensive resource detailing sources of support and information available for carers.

The research will also be written up into a report which will identify recommendations for service providers and agencies on how best to improve support to those helping to care for someone with dementia.
